

What happens next?

Children benefit from practice with sequencing. Sequencing is the understanding of how objects, events, and time occur in a specific and logical order. Learning this important concept allows children to recognize patterns, make predictions and problem solve. Practice with sequencing develops children's logical thinking, computer coding skills, story retelling and eventual reading comprehension.

Play Robot

This is a game that uses a lot of sequencing and communication skills. You play the robot and have your child give you very specific commands for you to follow. You might have your child tell you how to make a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. Fun and learning happens when your child forgets to tell the robot to open the jelly jar or where the jelly goes in the sandwich!

Family Photos

Use family photos to practice sequencing. Gather together some photos of your child, from the time they were born to the present. Mix up the order of the photos. Ask your child to place them in a sequence from youngest to oldest.

Sequencing Cards

Introduce a series of picture cards that tell a story. Have your child arrange the pictures in the correct order. Guide your child by asking what would happen first, second, next...
